June 28, 1969

Police raid the Stonewall Inn in New York City. Protests and demonstrations begin, and it later becomes known as the impetus for the gay civil rights movement in the United States.

June 28, 1970

Community members in New York City march through the local streets to recognize the one-year anniversary of the Stonewall Riots. This event is named Christopher Street Liberation Day and is now considered the first gay pride parade.

Marsha P Johnson (1945-1992)

Marsha P Johnson was a gay liberation activist and an African-American transgender woman. Known as an outspoken advocate for gay rights, Marsha was one of the prominent figures in the Stonewall uprising in 1969.

She co-founded the gay and transvestite advocacy organization S.T.A.R. (Street Transvestite Action Revolutionaries), alongside close friend Sylvia Rivera.

Sylvia Rivera

(1951-2002)

Sylvia Rivera was a Latina American gay liberation and transgender rights activist significant in the LGBT history of New York City and the US as a whole. Rivera, who identified as a drag queen, was a founding member of the Gay Liberation Front, the Gay Activists Alliance, and co-founded the Street Transvestite Action Revolutionaries (STAR) with Marsha P. Johnson, a group dedicated to helping homeless young drag queens, LGBTQ+ youth and trans women.

Bayard Rustin (1912-1987)

Despite efforts, even within the civil rights movement itself, to overshadow him because he refused to be closeted, history was never able to blot out the fact that Bayard Rustin was the chief organizer of the 1963 March on Washington, at which Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. delivered his groundbreaking "I Have a Dream" speech.
